



CITIES IN CRISIS Pivoting to support new realities in Ukraine and Moldova

Two light situation analyses were conducted in the Republic of Moldova and Ukraine, assessing the impact of the war on M4EG members. This served as a basis for the reprogramming of EUR 709,000 to better support the new realities of members. Municipalities continue to be supported with direct procurement of emergency goods and support to volunteers and volunteer schemes within municipalities. More than 500 IDPs have been directly supported, and more than 5,000 IDPs have been indirectly supported.

"What the war did with Trostianets is a nightmare. Everything is damaged – health centers, dozens of houses, private buildings, and critical infrastructure. Trostianets was liberated, and we will rebuild it even better because Trostianets was always a flagship city in Sumska Oblast. We need our partners' support as never before. Our needs vary drastically since all the economic sectors were affected,"



Areni is one of the first pilots for portfolio thinking, with the intention to leverage their local wine industry for sustainable tourism

The Portfolio Journey is a 2-year learning and testing programme with the opportunity to implement pilot actions with up to EUR 225,000 per city/town. The purpose is to demonstrate and test many interventions on how complex issues faced by local authorities (e.g. pollution, youth unemployment, digital shift, inequalities etc.) can be addressed. The municipal teams together with UNDP and the Chora Foundation embed themselves and go "hyperlocal" to explore how the municipality can help shape transformative change.



The 1st group of like-minded cities' portfolios are:

ARENI

Sustainable tourism – to enable and maintain a green environment for residents and attracting funding for infrastructure renewal. The aim is to have well-developed diversified tourism, self-reliant inhabitants, and an attractive community

BATUMI

Start-up ecosystem - contributing to shifting the local labour market from old sectors (seasonal tourism and construction dependent) to higher and tech skills together with new partners. The aim is to diversify, broaden and retain Batumi's talent pool, to make Batumi Georgia's second start-up capital, to ignite interest, develop start-up-savviness and encourage a culture of entrepreneurship and innovation with a particular focus on youth, and to enable the City Hall to become an enabler of Batumi's start-up ecosystem

CEADIR-LUNGA

Resilient energy system - affordable and renewable energy for residents and moving consumers from producers ("prosumers"). In context of an energy crisis, also immediate support to ensure affordability for low-income households and reduce dependence on imported energy

KUTAISI

Smart eco city - carbon neutral smart city, using natural resources efficiently, circular economy, green public spaces, local food, and moving from today to tomorrow's city. Connect Kutaisi to an international network of city leaders in this space to be able to learn from them.

The 4 municipalities designed 42 options in total, both active and "shadow". 14 will be implemented in the first phase of their portfolio.

URBAN IMAGINARIES

Urban imaginaries is designed as a learning journey to support small initiatives that seek to reimagine or reinvent key aspects of local living and that can become catalysts for urban make-over. Funding and technical support is provided to selected cities to support them to become familiar with complexity-informed approaches and apply them to design place-based solutions in collaboration with residents across a wide range of issues including economic development, tourism and urban development.

Cultural Life

The project seeks to improve its cultural infrastructure hubs to offer a more dynamic and flourishing cultural life. This will lead an enhanced cultural life, attracting tourists, preserving the rich cultural heritage of the region, and job creation to address the challenge of migration.

Public Transportation / Mobility

The project seeks to improve public transportation services between the communities, which are not well-developed and affect the mobility of a wide range of residents including those who are socially vulnerable and tourists. By reimagining connectivity between the central town and communities, they will be economic development of both the central city and surrounding communities.

Urban Development: Public Square



This project seeks to reimagine the city centre and make it more attractive for both residents and tourists by renovating its central roads, a key monument and park by taking into account feedback from the community.

RUSTAVI

Georgia



Economic Development: Citipreneurship for Youth

The project is reimagining the role of the municipal government as a connector, convener and amplifier to help the ecosystem collaborate around a diversity of initiatives that seeks to develop new skillsets in young people, ease job search and provide better career planning tools.

POTI



Urban Development: Central ParkThe project seeks to build on its earlier renovation of the central park by reaching out to multiple stakeholders, ranging from park visitors like parents and students to business owners and municipality teams, and prioritising the inclusion of historically excluded communities as well as ideas emerging from their research to increase accessibility, particularly for disabled communities.

SAMTREDIA

Urban Development: Local Sports Facilities

The project reimagines their sports infrastructure and activities to promote healthier lifestyles and increase regional tourism to the city particularly by reinvigorating facilities around the municipality swimming pool, through an understanding of health behaviours of their community and adoption of more sustainable and energy efficient choices

TSKALTUBO

Georgia

Urban Development: Cultural Sites

The project seeks to create vibrant social and cultural spaces away from the capital, improve the quality of life for local people and create the conditions for local and international tourism by building better linkages between surrounding villages and towns to their local cultural hubs.

CAHUL

Waste Management 2.0 The project focuses on improving the public service for waste collection and disposal by building capacity of waste collection sites and implementing initiatives such as the provision of waste

bins free of charge so they can expand this service to the entire city.




